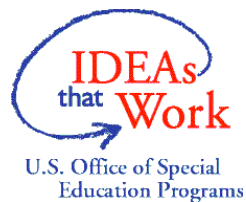

This collection of quick reference materials brings essential information about the *Individuals with Disabilities Education Act* (IDEA) data requirements together in one place. The IDEA Data Center (IDC) compiled these resources to serve as a valuable reference for new data managers, but these references may also be useful for experienced state staff who work with IDEA data and who need an easy way to reference key information.

Essential Contacts

The contacts listed in this section are essential contacts for IDEA data submissions and data quality. Ensuring that you know who to reach out to and when is essential for easily getting the support you need when necessary. The information in this section will assist you in contacting the correct people at the correct time.

IDC State Liaison

Your IDC State Liaison is your primary IDC contact. State Liaisons use expertise to assist states directly or assemble a team of IDC experts to support IDEA data quality improvement. You can find contact information for your IDC State Liaison on the [IDC Services webpage](#).

Your State Liaison will get to know you and your state's data and provide personalized support to make sure you have access to the highest quality and most relevant technical assistance (TA) possible.

If you have a question but are not sure if IDC can help, contact your State Liaison. In addition to the support IDC provides, we also have great working relationships with all the Office of Special Education Programs (OSEP)-funded TA centers. So, should you need additional information, your State Liaison can refer you to or work in concert with the appropriate TA center.

EDFacts Coordinator

Part B data collections are closely integrated with EDFacts data; therefore, as a Part B data manager or staff person who works with IDEA data, it is important to have a strong working relationship with your state's EDFacts coordinator(s). The Department of Education designates EDFacts coordinators as the lead state contacts for the EDFacts data collection. Communication with these individuals about data submission and data issues improves efficiency and overall data quality.

EDPass Manager

Starting with data from the 2022–23 school year (SY), EDPass is the system the Department of Education uses to collect most IDEA 618 data. Each state may have up to two identified EDPass managers; the first is typically the EDFacts coordinator. EDPass managers have access to all data areas in the EDPass system and administrative access to manage other state users' accounts in EDPass. It is important to know who your state's EDPass managers are. You will need to work with them to ensure that all staff have appropriate access to the IDEA Part B functionalities in EDPass that they need to complete the necessary components of the data submission process.

Functionalities in EDPass include viewing data, uploading data, responding to metadata, editing the State Submission Plan, resolving data quality rule failures, and submitting data.

IDEA Part B Essential Information Tables

The information in the following tables describes IDEA Part B 618 and 616 timelines and their due dates for the 2025 collection period.

Table 1 shows how different IDEA data collections span across years, information about the reporting period, and when the data are collected after the reporting period. Throughout a given school year, data stewards may be working with three different years of data concurrently; this table will help to clarify which years go with the various data collection categories.

States collect data on the specified Child Count date on or between October 1 and December 1. Data are due the following summer, the last Wednesday in July. The next submission date is 7/30/2025
Discipline	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> In the ED<i>Facts</i> Discipline files, states and LEAs report disciplinary removals for children and youth with disabilities including all children with 0.5 or greater cumulative days removed. Data represent the reporting period between July 1 and June 30. Data are due on the third Wednesday in February following the end of the reporting period. The next submission date is 2/18/2026.
Exiting	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> In the ED<i>Facts</i> Exiting file, states and LEAs report students with disabilities (IDEA) who are ages 14 through 21 and who were in special education at the start of the reporting period and who were not in special education at the end of the reporting period. Data represent the reporting period between July 1 and June 30. Data are due on the third Wednesday in February following the end of the reporting period. The next submission date is 2/18/2026.

Personnel	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • States and LEAs report the number of special education teachers, special education related services personnel, and special education paraprofessionals employed or contracted to work with children with disabilities (IDEA) who were ages 3 through 21. • States collect data on the specified Child Count date on or between October 1 and December 1. • Data from the previous school year are due on the third Wednesday in February. The next submission date is 2/18/2026.

Dispute Resolution	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • States report the number of occurrences of written, signed complaints; mediation requests; due process complaints; and expedited due process complaints. • Data represent the reporting period between July 1 and June 30. • Data are due on the third Wednesday in November following the end of the reporting period. The next submission date is 11/12/2025.
Maintenance of Effort (MOE) and Coordinated Early Intervening Service (CEIS)	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • States report LEA/ESA allocations; MOE reduction; provision of CEIS and the number of children receiving CEIS. • Data span multiple years. • Allocations for the two prior FFYs are due in the fall submission. • The next submission date will be for FFY 2023, SY 2023–24 data, which are due fall 2025.^a

^a As of publication, the [Data Submission Organizer](#) had yet to publish the FFY 2023 due date for this data collection.

Table 2 provides updated school year due dates and systems for SY 2024–25. In addition to being a system where states submit files, EDPass includes related metadata questions, which are due with each data submission.

Table 3 provides information about the data year that populates each indicator of the SPP/APR. Some indicators require states to populate them with the most recent data available, while some indicators require states to populate them with lag data. Additionally, using a January 2023 through June 2025 timeline, figure 1 illustrates how the school year, federal fiscal year, and the standard calendar year differ. When reading both items, it is important to remember the following:

Keep in mind

Data are reported by both fiscal year and school year as defined by the SPP/APR Measurement Table. For any indicators that have data prepopulated from an ED*Facts* data submission, the data will be reported for the school year rather than the fiscal year.

- School year (SY) dates are generally recognized as July 1 to June 30 in the years specified. States report data as of the dates noted in the data timeline details column in table 1.
- Federal fiscal year (FFY) is from October 1 of the year prior to the year listed to September 30 of the listed year. For example, FFY 2024 is from October 1, 2023, to September 30, 2024. In this example, data for FFY 2024 is expected to reflect SY 2024–25.
- Lag data indicates data reported for the year before the SPP/APR reporting year.

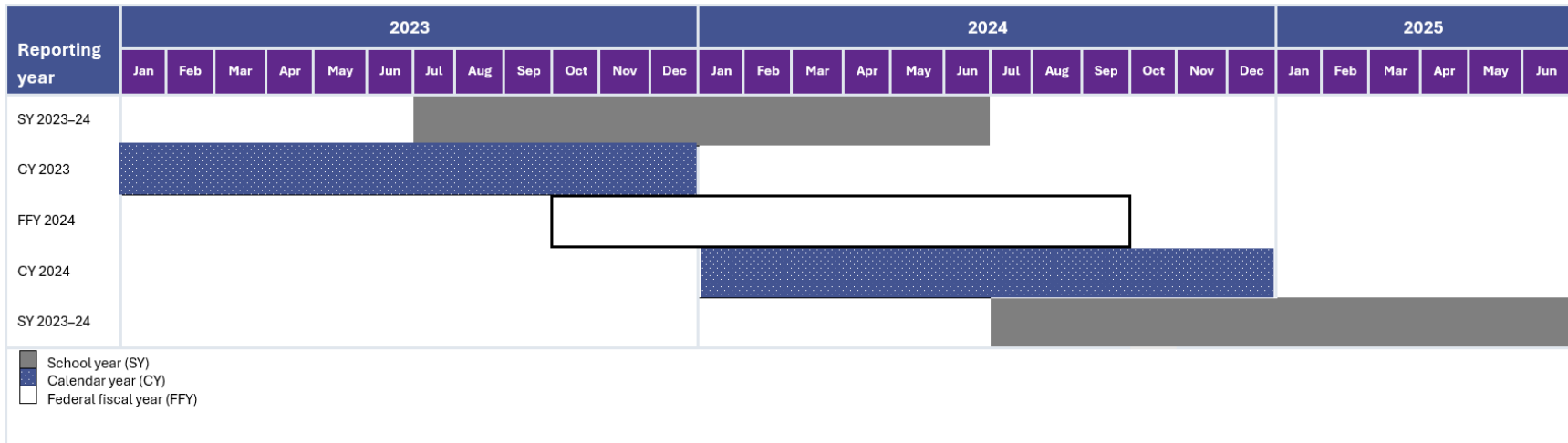
